
Elle Andra-Warner (nee Jürivee)



Born in a castle while in a post-war Estonian displaced persons camp in Eckernforde, West Germany, **Elle Andra-Warner** and her parents lived for a time in England before coming to Canada in the 1950s, settling in Port Arthur, Ontario (now part of the City of Thunder Bay).

Based in Thunder Bay, Elle is a best-selling author of non-fiction books (including *David Thompson* and *Edmund Fitzgerald: The Legendary Great Lakes Shipwreck*) as well as a journalist and photographer. Specializing in history, profiles and travel, her feature articles have appeared in publications around the world.

A political studies graduate of Lakehead University, Elle has been a life-long active volunteer in many local, provincial and national organizations. She is currently on the Board of Directors of the Thunder Bay Historical Museum Society, and is the coeditor of the museum's annual journal, *Papers & Records*.
